Job's visitor, Zophar, the Naamathite (Job 2:11) travelled to see Job from Naamah.

One of Job's visitors was Eliphaz the Temanite (Job 2:11). Eliphaz was one of Esau's three sons: Bela, Reuel, and Eliphaz (Gen 36:4,32-33). Eliphaz's own son was Teman. According to Gen 36:4,13,17,33 Eliphaz was Job's (Jobab LXX 42:17b-17e) grandfather Reuel's half-brother.

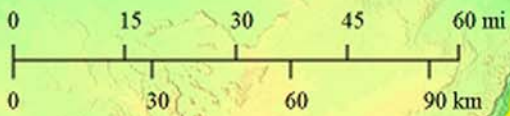
Seir was a Horite. The name Horite means cave-dweller. The famous palace-like caves of Petra are located here. The land here is beautiful, high, red rock walls, caves, springs, and hot springs.

The territory of Seir encompassed these mountain ranges until Esau took them over. Eventually, Moab controlled the upper region and Esau the lower. Uz was a great great grandson of Seir, most likely around the age of Esau's sons. The Land of Uz would be located somewhere in Seir territory near the Arabian desert.

The LXX says Job was also known as Jobab (LXX Job 42:17b-17e) and reigned as second king of Edom in the city of Bozrah (Gen 36:33). After Job (Jobab) died, Husham of the land of Temani (Eliphaz's line through Teman) reigned in his stead (Gen 36:34).

The very first king of Edom was Bela, son of Beor (Gen 36:31-32). This makes Beor most likely Esau's firstborn son by way of Judith (Gen 26:34). This is speculated seeing how much is said about Esau's first son, but the line of kingships apparently follows Beor (Bela), then Reuel (Job/Jobab), then Eliphaz (Husham of Teman) family lines (Gen 36:32-34). Dinhabah is the name of the Bela's city.
